TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2018

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements and auditor's report of the charitable company for the year 1 September 2017 to 31 August 2018. The annual report serves the purposes of both a trustees' report, and a directors' report under company law.

The Academy Trust operates Tomlinscote School and Sixth Form College, a highly regarded and consistently oversubscribed Secondary School in Surrey Heath. In May 2018 the school had 1,550 students on roll, including 195 in the Sixth Form.

On 1 September 2018, the operations of Tomlinscote School and Sixth Form College transferred to The Prospect Trust (company registration number 10842315). Surrey Heath Education Trust has been dormant since this date.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

The Academy Trust is a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity. The charitable company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the Academy Trust.

The charitable company is known as Surrey Heath Education Trust and operates as Tomlinscote School and Sixth Form College.

The Trustees of Surrey Heath Education Trust are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law. Details of the Trustees who served during the year are included in the Reference and Administrative Details on page 1.

The Local Governing Body is governed by the Surrey Heath Education Trust Scheme of Delegation, adopted on 16 July 2015.

Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charitable company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

Trustees' indemnities

The Academy Trust has opted into the Risk Protection Arrangements (RPA) which provides unlimited indemnity for employer's liability, third party liability, an unlimited professional indemnity and cover for buildings and contents limited to the reinstatement value. The RPA covers Trustees, Governors and other staff for liability arising from negligent acts, errors and omissions in good faith, notified during the insurance period. There were no third party indemnity provisions during the period September 2017 to August 2018.

Method of recruitment and appointment or election of Trustees

There are clearly defined procedures for the selection and appointment of Trustees which are set out in the Trust's Articles of Association. The Academy Trust seeks to recruit Trustees who are able to contribute the skills and knowledge required to support achievement of the aims of the Trust and ensure that these are delivered within a comprehensive governance framework. The Trust shall have a minimum of three trustees including:

- · The Executive Principal
- · A minimum of 2 Parent Trustees (unless these are represented on the Local Governing Body)
- Up to 2 Staff Trustees
- · Up to 5 Community Trustees
- Up to 1 Co-Opted Trustee
- · The Chairman of the Local Governing Body

Further details of the governance structure of the Trust is given in the Governance Statement on page 12.

Policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

The School continues to procure Governor Support Services from Babcock 4S. Maite Roel, Community Governor, had the responsibility for liaising with Governors to provide access to this support.

Induction of Governors is carried out by the Clerk via an information pack and telephone support.

Organisational Structure

In accordance with the Trust's Articles of Association, the business of the Trust is managed by the Local Governing Body through the Scheme of Delegation adopted July 2015. The Governing Body meets a minimum of once a term to execute its duties.

The Governing Body has the following committees:

- Resource
- · Teaching & Learning
- Salaries

The Composition of the Governing Body committees and their remit are reflected in the Governing Body papers, terms of reference and committee work programmes for the respective committees.

The Governing Body delegates to the Executive Principal the internal organisation, day to day management and control of the Trust, including monitoring and consistent implementation of all policies and procedural documents approved by the Governing Body.

The Executive Principal is the Accounting Officer as required by the Funding Agreement with the Department for Education.

Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

The only Trustees who receive pay or remuneration are those employed as members of the senior leadership team (SLT). The salary ranges of the team are set, and regularly reviewed, by the Salary Committee of the Academy Local Governing Body. One new member of SLT was appointed during this period (Mr A Daniel previously Associate Assistant Principal is now substantive Assistant Principal). The only changes to pay, or remuneration, were the result of 'annual increases' or performance related rises, in all cases within the previously agreed salary ranges.

Whether it is at appointment or annual review, the Salary Committee considers the advertised salary ranges for posts of comparable responsibility and size. Members of the committee then review the responsibilities of the SLT and whether the salary ranges are appropriate. The outcome of their deliberations is reported to the Local Governing Body and are consistent with the budget allocation for this element of staff remuneration.

Objectives and activities

Objects and aims

The objectives of the Trust are set out in the company's Articles of Association, namely "to advance for the public benefit education in the United Kingdom, in particular but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing by establishing, maintaining and developing schools offering a broad and balanced curriculum".

Objectives, strategies and activities

The Board of Trustees have set the Academy Trust's strategic aims through the School Development Plan. These aims are monitored closely by the Board of Trustees by way of Executive Principal and Senior Leadership Team Reports and through the work of the sub committees. During the Academic Year 2017-18, the Academy aimed to further raise the quality of Learning and Teaching through a development plan which had the following priorities:

- 1. Sixth Form Teaching & Learning
- 2. Maximise progress of students identified as Learning Support (K code)
- 3. Curriculum development
- 4. Challenge and differentiation
- 5. Technology
- 6. Closing the gaps

Public benefit

The Trustees have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit issued by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers and duties.

During the financial year the Academy Trust furthered its charitable purposes for the public benefit by teaching the full national curriculum and a broader curriculum to 11 to 16 year olds. The Academy Trust successfully sustained the Sixth Form provision, enabling its Key Stage 4 students to continue into Further Education as well as providing an opportunity to other local students. In addition, many of the students in the Upper Sixth Form successfully progressed to Higher Education or employment, often through high quality apprenticeships.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2018

Strategic report Achievements and performance

The main activity during the period under review was to continue to ensure that students' attainment and achievement was outstanding. Significant achievements include:

- This period saw the introduction of grades 9-1 for the majority of subjects. Despite the lack of guidance from examination boards, students performed strongly. 77% of Year 11 gaining grade 4 or above in both English and Mathematics (known as 'basics') and 57% gaining the more challenging measure of grade 5 in both areas. Figures are well above national averages. 88% of students gained a 4 or above in English with 80% reaching the same level in Mathematics.
- The progress measure is an excellent indication of the quality of education provided. The Progress 8 figure of +0.16 is likely to receive the second highest judgement, 'above average', in the language of the DfE Performance Tables. The value added figure is positive for all ability bands and particularly high for students with low prior attainment. The school expects the progress figures for all attainment bands to achieve these levels. A very high 42% of students gained the English Baccalaureate (EBacc). This reflects the school vision for provision of a very broad curriculum; for example 94% of students sat a GCSE in languages.
- There continues to be a performance gap between boys and girls of approximately half a grade per subject. While this is smaller than found nationally, it will continue to be a priority, alongside work to support disadvantaged students who, nationally, have found the demands of the new examination to be challenging.
- Sixth Form results combine A-levels and Vocational Courses. The prior attainment of Year 13 was significantly lower than comparable groups nationally and this is reflected in the highest attainment measures where figures are lower than national. The pass rate (A*-E) is at the national average. The ALPs value added system returned a score of 5, meeting the school target and in line with expectations nationally. Pass rates for vocational courses were high and the vast majority of students gained their places at their first choice university.
- Changes to the local funding formula have, for the first time, begun to address the significant underfunding the school has experienced the second lowest per pupil rate in the county. The goal of reaching the half way point to the National Funding Formula was restricted by the requirement for a funding cap in order to minimise losses to other, more generously funded, Surrey schools. A successful application (the third in four years) was made to the 'Condition Improvement Fund', resulting in reinstatement of safety features, new ceilings, lights and fire doors. Together with refurbishment of a food room, this was a £1m+ capital investment.
- The most significant challenge has continued to be the retention and recruitment of high quality teachers. The fact that this is also impacting local independent schools has meant they have appointed a number of staff from the Academy Trust. For example a trainee science teacher was appointed as Head of Science on a much higher salary and with a much shorter working year.
- Extra-curricular provision is extensive with a range of clubs, teams and charity events broadening the student experience. The Academy Trust continues to play a leading role in the development of the teaching of languages and students have visited a number of countries for language development while small groups of students have accessed rare opportunities through the German Embassy and the Goethe Institute. The Academy has had the prestigious International Schools Award renewed and has achieved Apple Distinguished School status.
- From 1 September 2017 the Academy Trust took over the running of Tomlinscote Sports Centre from Blue Leisure. The activities of the sports centre remain unchanged, providing sports and leisure facilities to the the local public.

Key Performance Indicators

The Academy was last inspected by Ofsted in May 2011 when it was judged to be Outstanding. Ofsted 'risk assessments' have judged that this status is retained. It is likely that during the next reporting period, the exemption of 'outstanding' schools from inspection will be removed.

The Academy judges that Overall Effectiveness is Good in both the Main School and the Sixth Form.

This is based on Outstanding teaching and broad provision. 72% of students were examined in the EBacc subjects, reflecting the school's ethos of languages for all students. This broad curriculum resulted in 42% of students gaining the EBacc. Students continue to access high quality, on site, vocational provision. The opportunities for international and work related experience are extensive and benefit a wide range of students.

Students contribute actively to school leadership and a positive ethos is evident in classrooms and social areas – students have high expectations of each other, as do the staff, and this results in a happy and safe school. Specific guidance has been provided to all students to help keep them safe in the areas of e-safety and the prevention of radicalization while promotion of 'British Values' has been an on-going theme through the year. The breadth of students' experience, gained from their families and the range of experiences provided by school, contributes to a positive moral, spiritual and cultural learning environment.

Many aspects of the experience of students at Tomlinscote would justify an outstanding judgement. Teaching is consistently good, or better, and recent outcomes show high attainment that is increasingly above national averages and progress measures that have improved significantly over recent years. Students communicate well orally and in writing. A support programme is in place for those with lower literacy skills and monitoring shows this to be successful.

This judgement is limited to good as the school believes students in Years 7-11 can make even more progress while the progress made on academic sixth form courses is not yet Outstanding.

Tables 1 and 2 provide a comparison summary of the school's performance in the Summer 2017 and 2018 examination seasons.

Going concern

On 1 September 2018, the entire operations, assets, liabilities and trade of the Academy Trust were transferred to The Prospect Trust (company number 10842315) at net book value. Since 1 September 2018, the Academy Trust has been dormant. As such, the Academy Trust is no longer a going concern.

However, the Trustees have concluded that Tomlinscote School and Sixth Form College as an operational unit has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about its ability to continue as a going concern. As such, the Trustees consider it appropriate to present the financial statements under the going concern basis, whilst noting that all operations are considered to be discontinued.

Financial review

Most of the Academy's income is obtained from the Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) in the form of recurrent grants, some of which are restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the ESFA during the year ended 31 August 2018 and the associated expenditure are shown as restricted funds in the Statement of Financial Activities.

The Academy also receives grants for fixed assets from the ESFA. In accordance with the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice, 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (SORP 2015), such grants are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities as restricted income in the fixed asset fund. The restricted fixed asset fund balance is reduced by annual depreciation charges over the expected useful life of the assets concerned.

During the year ended 31 August 2018, total expenditure of £10,413k (2017: £9,136k) was met by recurrent grant funding from the ESFA together with other incoming resources. The excess of expenditure over income for the year (excluding restricted fixed asset funds but including transfers from restricted fixed asset funds) was £755k (2017: £167k). Expenditure during the year included two significant one-off costs: the refurbishment of the Food Technology facilities, which cost £128k; and £91k of costs, incurred in 2016 and 2017, related to a potential capital project for which no definite implementation plans or timescale have yet been agreed.

At 31 August 2018 the net book value of fixed assets was £19,700k (2017: £20,199k). Movements in tangible fixed assets are shown in note 12 to the financial statements. The assets were used exclusively for providing education and the associated support services to the pupils of the Academy.

The Surrey County Council Pension Fund, in which the Academy participates, showed a deficit of £2,395k at 31 August 2018 (2017: £2,582k). Of this sum, £1,871k was inherited by Tomlinscote School from the Surrey County Council on 1 September 2013, the date the local authority's staff transferred to employment with the Academy.

The Academy held fund balances at 31 August 2018 of £17,788k (2017: £18,558k) comprising £17,385k (2017: £17,705k) of restricted funds and £403k (2017: £853k) of unrestricted general funds. Of the restricted funds, £19,780k (2017: £20,287k) is represented by tangible fixed assets and unspent capital grants. The pension reserve which is considered part of restricted funds was £2,395k (2017: £2,582k) in deficit.

Reserves policy

The Trustees have reviewed the reserves of the Trust. This review encompassed the nature of the income and expenditure streams, the need to match them with commitments and the nature of the reserves. As a result of this review a target reserve of 2% of the operational expenditure has been identified. At the year ended 31 August 2018 this equated to £206k. The Trustees intention is to carry forward a prudent level of resource that will enable the longer-term cyclical needs of Trust to be met as well as to hold a provision for any unforeseen contingencies.

The Trust's free reserves as at 31 August 2018 were £403k (2017: £853k).

Although the reserves are at a higher level than the policy requires the Trustees believe this to be a prudent amount in the context of future budget forecasts.

The Trust's restricted pension reserve was £2,395k (2017: £2,582k) in deficit as at 31 August 2018. The deficit is not an immediate liability of the Academy. Instead the deficit will be met through increased pension contributions on behalf of staff in the future.

Investment policy

The Trust has not invested any funds during this financial year. The Trust's Finance Policy notes the requirement for Trustees to "Take special care when investing the funds of the Trust" i.e. any investment that did take place would need to have proven low risk.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The Board of Trustees has considered the major risks to which it is exposed, in particular those relating to governance, finance, insurance, attainment, attendance, behaviour, health and safety, organisation, operations, safeguarding, reputation, HR and ICT.

The Board of Trustees have implemented a number of systems to assess and reduce risks that the Academy faces, especially in operational areas in relation to teaching, health and safety, (including school trips), behaviour management, and in relation to the control of finances. They have introduced policies and systems for the recruitment, selection and vetting of new staff, continuing professional development of staff, child protection, supervision of students around the school site and internal financial controls to minimise financial risk.

Adequate insurance has been arranged where significant financial risk remains. The Academy has an effective system of internal financial control as explained in the Statement on Internal Control.

Fundraising

The Trust does not generally undertake fundraising and specifically has not undertaken any fundraising during the reporting period 2017 to 2018. Consequently, there has been no engagement of commercial participators or professional fundraisers.

Plans for future periods

The Trust Board unanimously voted to transfer the operations of Tomlinscote School and Sixth Form College to The Prospect Trust, a relatively new local Trust that includes Farnborough Sixth Form College. As a result, the Surrey Heath Education Trust ceased to function as a Multi Academy Trust on 31st August 2018. This followed an extensive Due Diligence process and consultation process involving staff, local schools and the wider community. Academy staff have already worked with colleagues at the Sixth Form College to develop coordinated approaches to teaching and learning while the first shared services have been identified and begun to operate. The immediate priority is to test critical functions and then attention will move to developing systems across the Trust to meet the goals set out in the Trust Articles and Governance document.

GOVERNANCE STATEMENT

Scope of responsibility

As Trustees we acknowledge we have overall responsibility for ensuring that Surrey Heath Education Trust has an effective and appropriate system of control, financial and otherwise. However, such a system is designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives, and can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

The Board of Trustees has delegated the day-to-day responsibility to the Executive Principal as Accounting Officer, for ensuring financial controls conform with the requirements of both propriety and good financial management and in accordance with the requirements and responsibilities assigned to it in the funding agreement between Surrey Heath Education Trust and the Secretary of State for Education. The Executive Principal is also responsible for reporting to the Board of Trustees any material weaknesses or breakdowns in internal control.

Governance

The information on governance included here supplements that described in the Trustees' Report and in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities. The Board of Trustees has formally met 8 times during the year. Attendance during the year at meetings of the Board of Trustees was as follows:

As noted in the Trustees' Report, the key issue faced by the Board during the year was the decision to transfer operation of Tomlinscote School to a Multi Academy Trust.

Review of value for money

As Accounting Officer the Executive Principal has responsibility for ensuring that the Academy Trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The Accounting Officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The Accounting Officer considers how the Academy Trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the Board of Trustees where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where available. The Accounting Officer for the Academy Trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by:

- The Academy has prioritised a managed reduction in staffing levels following the decision in September 2017 not to recruit to A-level courses for commencement at that time. This has been aided by the growth in numbers in the main school as the increase in the Pupil Admission Number to 300 has begun to work through the year groups. A small number of staff have been allocated teaching at the Sixth Form College and this has also helped avoid the need for compulsory staff changes.
- The Academy is pleased to have secured a Condition Improvement Fund grant for the third time in four years, resulting in improvements to safety and condition. Alongside this, a food room has been completely refurbished using Academy capital funds. At the same time, a planning application has been submitted to build a 3G, floodlit sports facility to enhance school and community use as well as generating revenue. The Academy is pleased to have achieved a balanced outturn to the budget this year. This is a significant achievement and reflects careful monitoring of the staffing budget.

The purpose of the system of internal control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of academy trust policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in Surrey Heath Education Trust for the period 1 September 2017 to 31 August 2018 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and accounts.

Capacity to handle risk

The Board of Trustees has reviewed the key risks to which the Academy Trust is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The Board of Trustees is of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the Academy Trust's significant risks that has been in place for the period 1 September 2017 to 31 August 2018 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and accounts. This process is regularly reviewed by the Board of Trustees.

The risk and control framework

The Academy Trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the Board of Trustees;
- regular reviews by the Resource Committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
- · setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- · clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- · delegation of authority and segregation of duties; and
- · identification and management of risks.

The Board of Trustees has considered the need for a specific internal audit function and appointed Wilkins Kennedy as internal auditor for the year ended 31 August 2018. This work was carried out by a dedicated team from a separate office, completely independent of the external audit team.

The internal auditor's role includes giving advice on financial matters and performing a range of checks on the Academy Trust's systems of control and on the discharge of the Board of Trustees' financial responsibilities.

On a regular basis, the internal auditor reports to the board of trustees through the Resource Committee on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the financial responsibilities of the Board of Trustees. Recommendations received from the internal auditor have been considered by the Resource Committee and their implementation agreed and monitored.

The internal auditor delivered the agreed programme of work during the year and no material control issues were identified.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2018

1 Accounting policies

Surrey Heath Education Trust is a charitable company, limited by guarantee and registered in England and Wales. The address of its principal place of business is given on page 1 and the nature of its operations are set out in the Trustees' report.

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Academy Trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2017 to 2018 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

Surrey Heath Education Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

1.2 Going concern

The Trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate, i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the charitable company to continue as a going concern. The Trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue.

On 1 September 2018, the entire operations, assets, liabilities and trade of the Academy Trust were transferred to The Prospect Trust (company number 10842315) at net book value. Since 1 September 2018, the Academy Trust has been dormant. As such, the Academy Trust is no longer a going concern.

However, the Trustees have concluded that Tomlinscote School and Sixth Form College as an operational unit has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about its ability to continue as a going concern. As such, the trustees consider it appropriate to present the financial statements under the going concern basis, whilst noting that all operations are considered to be discontinued.

1.3 Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the Academy Trust has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the statement of financial activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet.

Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions, the Trust does not have unconditional entitlement to the income. Recognition of the income is deferred and the amount is included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the period for which it is receivable, and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2018

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Other income

Other income, including the hire of facilities and income generated by the Sports Centre, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the Academy Trust has provided the goods or services.

Donated fixed assets

Donated fixed assets are measured at fair value unless it is impractical to measure this reliably, in which case the cost of the item to the donor is used. The gain is recognised as income from donations and a corresponding amount is included in the appropriate fixed asset category and depreciated over the useful economic life in accordance with the Academy Trust's accounting policies.

Upon becoming an Academy Trust, ownership of the school site transferred to the charitable company. These assets were recognised in the financial statements at its valuation under the depreciated replacement cost model.

1.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Charitable activities

These are costs incurred on the Academy Trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the Academy Trust apportioned to charitable activities.

1.5 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Assets costing £3,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the balance sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. The related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities and carried forward in the balance sheet. Depreciation on such assets is charged to the restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities so as to reduce the fund over the useful economic life of the related asset on a basis consistent with the Academy Trust's depreciation policy. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2018

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful life, as follows:

Land and buildings

over 15 to 50 years

Computer equipment

over 5 years

Fixtures, fittings & equipment

over 10 years

Motor vehicles

over 5 years

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.6 Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the Academy Trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

1.7 Leasing commitments

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged against income on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

1.8 Financial instruments

The Academy Trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the Academy Trust and their measurement basis are as follows.

Financial assets

Trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities

Trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition.

Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

1.9 Taxation

The Academy Trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the Academy Trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by chapter 3 part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

1.10 Pensions benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the Academy Trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes and the assets are held separately from those of the Academy Trust.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the Academy Trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quadrennial valuations using a projected unit method. The TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions are recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the Academy Trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the statement of financial activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

1.11 Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the Academy Trust at the discretion of the Trustees.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Department for Education Group.

1.12 Agency arrangements

The Academy Trust acts as an agent in distributing 16-19 bursary funds from the ESFA. Payments received from the ESFA and subsequent disbursements to students are excluded from the statement of financial activities as the Trust does not have control over the charitable application of the funds. The Trust can use up to 5% of the allocation towards its own administrative costs and this is recognised in the statement of financial activities. The funds received and paid and any balances held are disclosed in note 24.

2 Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Accounting estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The Academy Trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost or income for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 18, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2013 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2018. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

Critical areas of judgement

No judgements have been made in determining the amounts reported in the financial statements.

Other DFE/ESFA grants: This includes all other funding received from the ESFA and DFE, excluding capital grants.

Other government grants: This includes all funding received from Surrey County Council and grant from other government bodies.

Other restricted funds: This includes all non-grant restricted income, including donations to the laptop fund.

Transfers

A transfer of £747,000 was made from the fixed asset fund to the General Annual Grant fund to reallocate the CIF funding received for the repair works to the windows and cladding.

18 Pension and similar obligations

The Academy Trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by Surrey County Council. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The pension costs are assessed in accordance with the advice of independent qualified actuaries. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2012 and that of the LGPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016.

Contributions amounting to £101,000 (2017: £107,000) were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2018 and are included within creditors.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

Introduction

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for full-time teachers in academies and, from 1 January 2007, automatic for teachers in part-time employment following appointment or a change of contract, although they are able to opt out.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and members contribute on a 'pay as you go' basis - these contributions along with those made by employers are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2012 and in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 9 June 2014.

(Continued)

The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 16.48% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% employer administration charge
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £191,500 million, and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £176,600 million giving a notional past service deficit of £14,900 million
- an employer cost cap of 10.9% of pensionable pay will be applied to future valuations
- the assumed real rate of return is 3.0% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate
 of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.75%. The assumed nominal rate of return is 5.06%

The TPS valuation for 2012 determined an employer rate of 16.4%, which was payable from September 2015. The next valuation of the TPS is currently underway based on April 2016 data, whereupon the employer contribution rate is expected to be reassessed and will be payable from 1 April 2019.

The pension costs paid to the TPS in the period amounted to £547,000 (2017: £537,000).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The Academy Trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The Academy Trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local Government Pension Scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined-benefit scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contributions are as noted below. The agreed contribution rates for future years are 30.4% for employers and a variable rate for each employee based on salary. The estimated value of employer contributions for the forthcoming year is £273,000.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.

24 Agency arrangements

The Academy Trust distributes 16-19 bursary funds to students as an agent for the ESFA. In the accounting period ended 31 August 2018, the Trust received £22,763 and disbursed £13,226 from the fund.
