To see the visors being utilised by our fantastic NHS is great. It is humbling to know that Tomlinscote is playing its part in this titanic battle.














Karolina in 7X has taught her cat the art of camouflage. It still can't disguise the fact that her cat is asleep again!










Issi in 9P obviously hasn't managed to get Jerry interested in reading any books yet, he is far happier sleeping in the sun!

Amelia Earhart- Letter to her husband written while stranded on an island.

Dear G.P.P,

Thank you. Thank you for the years of happiness you have given me. As much as I had wanted this letter to sound strong, I am afraid that that wall is already crumbling. So I shall tell you what happened, how I have come to be here on Gardner Island:

To avoid the storm above Howland Island, my navigator Fred Noonan suggested we travelled southwest, aiming for Gardner Island. Due to the peculiar shape of the island it was only possible that we would land in the sea. With the fuel supply dwindling, I suppose it was a stroke of luck that the plane crashed into the sea a short distance from the beaches of the island. By that time poor Fred had fallen unconscious, and his belt was trapped in the plane's side-door. I managed to get out but he was dead weight to carry. I know that persisting to get him out would have resulted in us both drowning, but I cannot help thinking I should have tried harder. A few simple things have washed up from the plane, including this paper I am writing to you with, and a convenient glass bottle. I'll throw it, with this letter inside, as far over the ocean as I can. Once it is found by someone, I hope they pass it onto you. Furthermore I ask that you do not publish it, or in fact tell anyone of it - I see it as a negative end to my reputation. I don't wish to be remembered as a weak woman who could not survive stranded on an island. Truthfully, I fear that these unfortunate events will lead to many regretting my ambitions and confirming that women should not be allowed to fly. This cannot happen, and I hope that they learn from my mistakes, not bury them forever.

I am sorry, George, that your six persistent proposals lead only to six short years of marriage. I am sorry for Noonan's fate in that plane beneath the dreaded ocean. Yet most of all, I am sorry that my inevitable death should bring any sorrow to the world, or cause any female aviators to regret their risks, or their far more dangerous hesitations of an opportunity because of my fate. For that, I cannot regret my decisions.
