


Tomlinscote hopefully recording history!






We're sure that Eliza in Year 7 will have had to shoo her family away from these beautiful caramel choux puffs. There are no obvious gaps, so she was probably successful.


Positive vibes from the whole Tomlinscote Science Department

Mrs Sangar's students might fare better as her daughter is clearly doing the marking!

















Positive vibes from the Science department Cont'd






Positive vibes from the Science department Cont'd

Mr Frater has certainly been putting his creative skills to good use over the last week or two.


As well as setting lessons and other administrative duties, he has been busy assembling a very complicated looking cot, cooking and plumbing! He has managed the following accomplishments:


LRC Reading Tips



Oliver made a delicious chicken kebab served in a tortilla. He has produced such a colourful dish, it looks so tasty and appealing.


Both of the dishes look amazing and we hope that all the family got to enjoy them.

Raeleah Raath made such a huge salad for her family that it wouldn't actually fit in a jar! At least no-one will go hungry.




Docs, dogs, deer and dedication!

2706 face shields316 scrub bags568 ear relievers17 scrub caps










Snakes alive!

If you need a reminder, however, Mr Morren has done a fantastic job piecing together a Jazz Band performance of 'Frankenstein' by the Edgar Winter group.


All of the students recorded their tracks separately at home using their iPads and then sent them to Mr Morren to piece together.

If, however you fancy a break from the sun, The Globe Theatre still has 3 Shakespeare plays scheduled.





