It has been brilliant to have so much teaching going on in the school and to see many Year 10 students. I think they have enjoyed being back in school and having some sort of normality again. I have decided to extend the 'face to face' contact with Year 10 by trying to get more students in every day. Furthermore, we have invited every Tutor Group into school to meet their Tutor and have a chance to catch up with one another. They will meet in groups of 10 students at a time over the remaining weeks. I feel this is important from a pastoral point of view and it means that every student will have had the opportunity to be on the Tomlinscote site before the summer break. With so many staff coming into school over the next few weeks, I would like to stress that something has to give. Consequently, there may be less feedback to your son/daughter and reduced Home Learning contact in the next few weeks.

Last night we distributed our virtual Year 6 Transition video to our new parents. Like everything else at the moment, the whole induction programme has needed to change. We are having a Year 6 Induction Day on Wednesday 2nd September 2020 and a few students will get the chance to visit the school in July.

The Face shield production initiative has come to an end, I am really pleased to announce that we made:

Face shields - 2861, Scrub bags - 386, Ear relievers - 635, Scrub hats - 60, Face masks for NHS - 29 and 4 Scrubs.

This is quite remarkable and I feel that Tomlinscote has really supported the local community at this difficult time. Thank you to Mrs. Lines who led this initiative and the team of happy volunteers.

I would like to highlight our last INSET of the year which was postponed from May. It will be on Wednesday 8th July 2020 and I think the majority of our students thoroughly deserve a day off from Home Learning.

I hope you enjoy the Newsletter, it is interesting to see the excerpt from 1977. There will be much more over the next few weeks looking back at our history at Tomlinscote. 


Newsletter News

By now, you will all be familiar with the format of the Tomlinscote Newsletter. During normal term time it is filled with articles about trips that have taken place, performances, displays and classroom activities. During lockdown it has become a portal through which we have kept in touch and enabled us to feel together as a community even though the restrictions have prevented it.

The Tomlinscote Newsletter didn't used to be like this, in fact it was only produced once a year and was circulated as a printed booklet. It was called 'Magma' and contained, as now a piece by the Head teacher, student work, House news, school productions and much more.

Account of the School Year 1977

"The new school year commenced in early September after a break of six weeks. For the first time Tomlinscote, which has been growing since 1970, has its full quota of pupils ranging from the second year to the upper sixth year, a total of one thousand, one hundred and fifty children.

Early in September, trips were organised for pupils to the popular Richmond Ice Rink and to other destinations designed to satisfy a wide range of interests.

Visits of a more academic nature have been undertaken by members of the Sixth Form as a part of their coursework. This took the form of Geography and Biology field- trips to various regions of Britain.

In the sphere of musical interest, the orchestra took part in the Woking Music Festival, giving an outstanding performance and being awarded an honours certificate. On a less traditional note, discos organised by both the sixth form and houses were enjoyed by a wide range of pupils and the appearance of the sixth form group 'Union Jack' proved popular on these occasions.

The approach of Christmas saw an intensification of extra-curricular activities. The end of term was preceded by the customary school carol service held at St. Peter's Church, Frimley. Many pupils also took part in carol-singing on local estates in order to raise money for house charities.

The Spring term commenced with Upper Sixth Formers immediately facing two weeks of 'A' Level trials. The fifth year continued their 'O' Level Trial Examinations.

The 25th February was the departure date for a group of fourth year pupils, their destination the homes of some of the inhabitants of St. Aubin les Elbeuf in France. They returned eleven days later and their French counterparts arrived in Camberley during late March in order to sample life in an English school and to visit local places of interest.

This term was important for third years who faced many decisions concerning careers and 'O' Level prospects. They were aided in their choice by the Annual Careers' Day which this year presented an unprecedented selection of possible careers.

Spring term brought notable successes for the school in district competitions. Tomlinscote fourth years won the Road Safety Competition held at Collingwood School and Tomlinscote, this year the host school, also achieved an outstanding result in the Public Speaking Competition when two Sixth Year pupils won all the prizes.

'Romeo and Juliet' the school's first Shakespearian production was greeted with great enthusiasm and marked the end of the Spring Term" (written by 2 students)





It's very interesting to see that back in 1977 Tomlinscote Drama Department put on 'Romeo and Juliet'. As you will recall, our most recent production was a comedy version of 'Macbeth'. Clearly times have not changed that much. Even the costumes have an uncanny resemblance.

Last year, as you will recall, we decided to reintroduce a House system, dividing up the student population into 5 Houses, Mandela, Rowling, Pankhurst, Attenborough and Hawking.

Back in 1977, Tomlinscote again had houses. There were 6 and they were named after cathedral cities in England, namely Canterbury, Durham, Ely, Salisbury, York and Winchester.



Exchange Trips - then and now

The French Exchange Trip had a very similar feel to the trip we know today. Students still had to arrive at school very early travelling on to Newhaven from where they caught a ferry to Dieppe.


On arriving in France, however, instead of the coach travel undertaken today, they caught a train to Rouen where they got a connection to Elbeuf. The daily routines, however, were very similar. Students spent the week experiencing French family life and were bombarded with the French language. They also visited the local town to practise their French in the local shops and cafes.

Due to the 1977 French destination being further East, students were able to benefit from a trip to Paris, managing a trip up the Eiffel Towel and a tour of the Palace of Versailles.






From the Lrc



This week we wanted to provide some awesome resources **about** literature. We've compiled a selection of interesting TED talks which we think students and parents will enjoy watching. Happy learning!







Emma from 7H, is piling on the pressure with her swim across the carpet!




Eva from 7H wants to add another string to her bow. It looks as though she has managed a good solo attempt!
