Dear Parents and Carers

The school has been getting busier each day with approx. 80 Year 10 students, 45 Keyworker students and 120 students in form groups on site. It is starting to feel more normal especially as greater numbers of teaching and support staff are also present in order to prepare for September. Year 9 remote learning reports were distributed yesterday and these can be found on Go4Schools for each student.

There is a great deal of work going on behind the scenes interpreting the DfE guidance for September and this has an impact on the production of our timetable and school planning. I will outline arrangements for the first few days in my end of term letter to you all next week. However, I will write a letter to everyone on Monday 24th August 2020, providing more detailed information about our measures and procedures for the new academic year. The logistical demands on secondary schools, following the guidance, are huge and I need time to carefully plan and prepare the school.

<u>Battlefields trip</u> - The Year 9 Battlefields trip was due to go out from 13th-15th November 2020. Unfortunately, we will need to cancel this trip. At the moment foreign school trips are not allowed and we would be required to pay the final balance for the trip at the beginning of September. I left the decision as late as possible because I know that it is such a valuable trip for the students. The Prospect Trust are committed to ensuring that everyone will receive their deposit back in full and we will start to process the refunds as soon as possible.

In September, our 3G pitch should be ready and I would like to draw your attention to the footwear requirements. **Students will need to have football boots with moulded studs**. Other types of footwear cannot be worn on the surface so please see the guidance on page 7. It is going to be a brilliant state of the art facility but it will need to be carefully looked after during school and by local football clubs.

We have our last Newsletter next week and I will also produce an end of term letter before the school closes on Friday 17th July at 12 noon for the summer holidays.

Filming took place over two days on location in London".

Pupils found themselves with an unexpected afternoon off school when gas workers cut through a mains electricity cable.

Pupils from Tomlinscote School, Frimley were sent home on Monday as temperatures dropped. Deputy Head Dr John Trigg said "We found ourselves without light, heat, dinner or telephones. When it got to midday we took the decision to close the school". (November 1992)

Frimley school is pulling out all of the stops to raise money for Comic Relief. A highlight of the week at Tomlinscote School will be the visit of television star Jet of "Gladiators" fame who will be leading an aerobics class in the sports centre".



Eggscellent News





We managed to snap a picture of her settled on the nest through our office window, and she doesn't seem to be bothered by us working in our office.

We haven't seen any of the eggs hatch yet, but we're hoping they may do soon!

Blackbirds usually lay 3-5 eggs, and the female bird incubates them alone as she is better camouflaged (although nesting in our bird feeder is a little conspicuous!). The eggs usually hatch after two weeks, and both parents then feed the chicks until they fledge. We haven't named them yet, but if you have any ideas then please let us know!

When we came into the LRC this week we were delighted to discover that our office window birdfeeder had been repurposed as a nest!

As there was no mother bird around, we checked the nest to see if it was being used and found four little blue eggs.

After waiting a while to see if mama bird would come back to the nest, a little blackbird appeared and settled down on top of the eggs.

We have been careful to keep our distance and not disturb her any further, but due to the proximity of the bird feeder to our office window we have been able to keep an eye on her and the eggs.



Mrs Sparkes has demonstrated another skill, namely knitting. She has created this medal for her 'winning' teddy.





Congratulations to a group of Year 9 students who have been awarded a highly prized accolade for their hard work and commitment.

Judges at the University of Oxford have commended the girls for their recent entry to the Oxford-German Network National Competition entitled "Ein Roboter in der Schule" (a robot in the school).

There were many entries to this competition and the girls have been placed 3rd in the UK for their category.

Team leader Maria explains:

"The robot is able to pick up litter and put it in a bin, in order to keep the school litter-free as well as protecting the wildlife and preventing pollution and the effects of climate change. We made the robot from a Lego Mindstorms set and we programmed it for this purpose."


