


#### "Novel Crimes: A Literary Whodunit"

Several mathematical topics were covered including number patterns, estimation, probability, geometry, logic problems and lots of algebra.




#### Year 7 have a shot at an engineering challenge!



With Health & Safety in mind, we hope they weren't too successful!



On Friday 23rd February, the Year 8 Boys A Team travelled to Robert May's to continue their League campaign. After a goalless first half saw the better chances fall to Robert May's after quick counters or defensive mistakes against the run of play, Tomlinscote quickly asserted their dominance. After the break, following a free kick on the wing, the May's keeper misjudged the flight of Jamie Robertson's cross-shot. The ball was deflected into Player of the Match, Jay Coomb's path inside the six-yard box - a chance Jay could not miss!

Six minutes later, a wonderful cross field angled pass from Rivan Pradhan, a first-half sub, found the run of Coombs who finished coolly past the oncoming goalkeeper. This deflated the opposition somewhat and Tomlinscote spent more and more time in the opponents half, soon making the pressure tell when Indy Miles broke down the left before delivering a beautiful ball across the six-yard box for the onrushing Josh Saunders to tap in from close range. On Monday 26th February the Year 8 Boys A Team hosted Oakmoor in their final league game of the season. After just five minutes, Jamie Robertson beat the full back before putting in a lovely cross for Jay Coombs to tap in to an open net. A few minutes later, Coombs repaid the favour, playing a through ball between the centre back and full back for Robertson to score. At this point, the Tomlinscote lads cranked up the pressure and on 15 minutes more excellent work from Robertson saw him go on a mazy run, beating numerous players including the Oakmoor keeper, assisted (somewhat unintentionally) by centre forward Dan Dixon.

The second half enabled a few changes to the lineup, although this didn't affect the rhythm of the Tomlinscote attack, and another solo effort from Robertson ten minutes in ended with a deflected effort from the edge of the box nestling in the back of the net to secure his hat-trick. Five minutes from time, Robertson added his fourth, and Tomlinscote's fifth after he arrived late in the box to get on the end of an excellent pull back by second-half sub James Mayne on the left. The win sees Tomlinscote finish their league campaign with 6 wins from 7, scoring 20 and conceding just two (both in one game!)!!




